"GOING TO AMERICA" by Richard Liew

Part 3

The year is 1971 now. The Vietnam War was thought to be winding down, but rioting continued on, campuses sit -ins and rioting meant that you could not attend classes. The private college that I attended was spared of the disruptions. Being a foreign student, I



had to move on to complete our education. So, I stuck on till



Like many others, I attended a protest march with my room mates as observers in downtown San Francisco. Chanting of

slogans such as 'love and not war' were loud and clear. But fear soon set in when violence broke out and policemen on horses



moved in. The rioters set ablaze overturned police cars. Plume of smoke from tear gas canisters started to fill the air. We started to move out and a white American screamed at our direction, "Go

home to fight your own war". We cleared out in a hurry for fear of getting caught up in the riot, danger of getting injured, caught and getting deported from the country.

We held gatherings on weekends to share news from home, share a toast or so for birthdays while a long way from home. There was always a reason to celebrate.

We attended a few rock concerts at the aging Fillmore West, a



large indoor auditorium. There was never short of 'grass' to puff during the concert. It automatically passed on down the line after one puff and you would not miss it. Stoned and friendly and so it went with all the psychedelic lights and music blasting through your ears. The hippie life style I embraced for a short while was quite a ride. So life went on.


Long hair groupies hung out together and with flowers on their hair. There were few rough places we stayed away such as Haight immigrant in Canada. -Ashbury District and Mission District.

On a nice cool day, we would go to Union Square to watch the Hare Krisha perform in the public square.

Close to where we live, there was this pub called 'Sgt. Pepper Lonely Heart" and was the place we hung out for live rock actions. The band was rocking with all the Beatles' songs, you name it. Get Back' was the hit song then. Those days, few Asians hung out there and the crowd did not quite like us but we didn't care and we just rocked on till closing.

In 1970, Aster Leong, my grade school sweetheart immigrated to

Vancouver, BC, to be closer to where I was then. She would commute on long weekends to San Francisco often.





easier for me to immigrate to Canada. I got everything arranged with help from my friends and room mates. On July 14, 1971, we got married in San Francisco City Hall. The chamber was full and they were not guests. They were all couples waiting for their turn before the Judge. My best man was Gordon Wong. The other best man was a great college friend, Michael Wong who was living in San Jose, California. Within a few minutes, we became a married couple. Later that evening, we had 20 guests at our wedding reception in a Chinatown restaurant named Sun Ya on Clay Street.

The following day, we took a Greyhound bus to Los Angeles for our no-frills honeymoon. Back from the trip, I stayed on in San Francisco to complete my education while Aster continued here commute back and forth from Vancouver.

My best man Michael found me a car for \$400. It was an Oldsmobile Cutlass. A few months later, he had to fix the engine gasket for me. I drove to San Hose leaving a trail of white plume of smoke down Hwy 1. I had to make a few stops to fill up the radiator. The repair work took a whole day.

So, came April 1972, I finally graduated with a BSc in Electronics. Moving day came, and the old Cutlass was loaded up with, in today's term, all junk. Aster was with me for the drive to Vancouver. The drive was two days. Finally, we reached Peach Arch border crossing. The Customs officer said 'make sure you drive the car back to USA when you want to junk it'. I said 'yes sir', then continued on down Hwy 99 to Vancouver and became a landed
